Peace

I used to think that peace was when the bills were paid and I had plenty of whiskey to drink and the family was gone. Time went by and peace was something of an afterthought that I could not achieve anymore. I was always running from the voices in my head or trying to find another way to stay out of jail one more time. I remember sitting in the county jail and thinking that this was the only place that I was not chasing the voices away. I came to Alcoholics Anonymous to stay out of jail and I could not stay sober as I could not shut the voices in my head up. I spent 18 months chasing my tail and lying to the courts and probation officers until something happened that I still can not explain. I would blackout when drinking and not remember anything, but this time I woke up and remembered everything and it was not the worse drunk I'd ever had. The voices were quiet and I could see myself for the first time ever, and I could see the person that I had become - the person everyone said that I was. I was very sick and scared and I knew that I was going to die like this and I knew that I did not want that. I went back to AA because I did not want to die a drunk. I made the decision that I was going to give AA a chance which meant I was going to have to listen to someone other than the voices, and do the work necessary to get well. The next day I went to my probation officer and told her the truth about me. I did not do this because I was hoping for compassion. I did it because I was told by my sponsor that I had to start fresh. I was given a second chance and I have made the very best of it for quite a while now. I understand what peace is today. I do not have it all the time as the voices still try to get their point across once in a while. Peace is being OK when everything is good and being OK when everything isn't, and it is only achieved when you are in good spiritual condition. Robert C.

Our Timeless Treasure

At long last the mystery of the Serenity Prayer has been solved! We have learned who wrote it, when it was written and how it came to the attention of the early members of A.A. We have learned, too, how it was originally written, a bit of information which should lay to rest all arguments as to which is the correct quotation. The timeless little prayer has been credited to almost every theologian, philosopher and saint known to man. The most popular opinion on its authorship favors St. Francis of Assisi. It was actually written by Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr, of the Union Theological Seminary, New York City, in about 1932 as the ending to a longer prayer. In 1934 the doctor's friend and neighbor, Dr. Howard Robbins asked permission to use that part of the longer prayer in a compilation he was making at the time. It was published in that year in Dr. Robbins' book of prayers. Dr. Niebuhr says, "Of course, it may have been spooking around for years, even centuries, but I don't think so. I honestly do believe that I wrote it myself." It came to the attention of an early member of AA in 1939. He read it in an obituary appearing in the New York Times. He liked it so much he brought it in to the little office on Vessey St. for Bill W. to read. When Bill and the staff read the little prayer, they felt that it particularly suited the needs of A.A. Cards were printed and passed around. Thus the simple little prayer became and integral part of the A.A. movement. Today it is in the pockets of thousands of AA's; it is framed and placed on the wall of AA meeting rooms though out the world; it appears monthly on the back cover of your magazine and every now and then someone tells us that we have quoted it incorrectly: We Have.

As it was originally written: God give me the serenity to accept things which cannot be changed; Give me courage to change things which must be changed; And the wisdom to distinguish one from the other.

Dr. Niebuhr doesn't seem to mind that his prayer is incorrectly quoted...a comma ... a preposition ... even several verbs ... the meaning and the message remain intact. "In fact," says the good doctor, "in some respects, I believe your way is better."

Firecrackers


When we first go into


